## Is Franklin Island part of Encounter Lakes?



Late in 2014 the Developer's warranty period expired and responsibility for ongoing maintenance of Franklin Island passed to The City of Victor Harbor.

At a recent meeting with the Council we were asked to consider our views on inviting residents of Franklin Island to be included in ELRGI and be represented at committee level.

Given we are all part of a single lake system and are both covered by the Council's Encounter Lakes Management Plan, the proposal seems to make sense.

## ALMOST!

During the week before Christmas routine testing of Lake water indicated higher than normal microbiological results from the Tabernacle Rd sampling point.

Council has no option but to close at least part of the Lake in these circumstances until further testing shows that the water quality is acceptable



The interstate Lab that tests Lake water was closed till Jan 6th so we faced the possibility of the Lake being closed for weeks.

ELRGI Secretary Wilf Emmett was formerly with SA Water and between he and Council's Steve Bateman arranged for SA Water to re-test the lake water. With good results, the lake re-opened. **A great Christmas initiative.**

Beaches around the Lake are generally in good condition and the Council continues to be responsive when requests are submitted for top up sanding.




There are several areas around the Lake where water movement is restricted and this tends to increase algae

# More Parks Around Encounter Lakes

So far we have mainly described parks on the Matthew Flinders side of the suburb. In this issue we will concentrate on the Nicolas Baudin side.

Now, let's have a look at the parks and gardens on the sea side of Encounter Lakes.



**Above** – John W Crompton Jr Reserve, Tabanacle Rd. **John Crompton OAM was Mayor of Victor Harbor from 1993 to 2003.**

**It seems appropriate that this reserve has a carpark, as John Crompton Jr's father brought the first car into Back Valley, a 1924 Dodge**

**Below** - The Herb E Welsh Reserve in Islander Drive is one of the smaller and least usable of our parks.

**A search of Council archives turned up nothing on Herb Welsh. Between 1946 and 1950 a Hamilton Welch was Chairman of Encounter Bay Council. Possibly a typo?**

**Below** - Brian Spilsbury Reserve, in Nicolas Baudin Drive. Right on the lake, this is a small but beautiful park.. **Brian Spilsbury was Mayor of Victor Harbor from 1989 to 1993**



**Left** – Coote Reserve on Encounter Terrace is the sea side face of Joy Beer Park in Nicolas Baudin Drive. The valves that control the flow of water into and out of the lake are located in these parks. **Named after Samuel Coote, a long serving employee of the Victor Harbor Council.**

It has been an interesting exercise to discover the history behind some of the names we see every day.

There would be very few suburbs the size of Encounter Lakes with as many parks as we enjoy. No wonder it's such a great place to live.
