
Levels such as these are typical for the winter months when the lakes have reduced use and heavy rain reduces contamination levels.

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It's Rip Rap Inspection Time

Sounds like something we would have danced to many years ago, but it is as mundane as inspecting the rock revetment for weeds.

The inspection, by boat, is normally planned for October so it may happen before you get

your newsletter.

We get asked for the dates when Council is expected to re-launch the boat to spray the weeds. This is a difficult question as spraying is only done in windless days for obvious reasons. Wind in 2024 put spraying plans back by several months.

Waterfront residents should not venture onto the "rip rap" to poison or pull weeds as the unstable surface is dangerous and can result in serious injuries

As an aside, you might be interested in why the rock revetement is known as "rip rap". The term is nautical from the 1600's and relates to stones used to build foundations for under-water structures.

A little more Storm-Water for our Lakes

Those of you who drive down Bartel Boulevard may have noticed that work is proceeding at a pace to construct the 24 houses being built on the land formerly owned by the Salvation Army.




Building houses on previously vacant land can increase stormwater runoff by several hundred percent, due to the replacement of pervious ground with impervious surfaces like roofs, roads and footpaths.

This increased runoff not only overwhelms drainage systems but also carries pollutants into waterways, degrading water quality and harming aquatic ecosystems.

With about 650 houses in the lakes sub-divisions the increase in storm water flows into both lakes will only be 4%; not enough to concern us.









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cleaning the grilles on the sea end of the inlet pipe. We all know about the rate of growth of algae, oysters and mussels on rocks and jetty piles over time. The same situation applies to the pipe-work from the lake to the ocean.

You may notice the boat in PIC 1 moored at the marker off Franklin Parade where the inlet/outlet pipe terminates. Each year divers inspect all pipes at both the lake and sea ends.

It will be interesting to see the level of build-up of oysters, mussels and sand in the ocean intake pipe following the thorough clean last year and Council increasing the water volume used during each subsequent flush.

As part of the inspection the diver swims into each end of the pipes to assess condition and chip out oyster and mussel growth.

PIC 2 shows the stainless steel outlet grille gate. The growth is mainly soft algae and after 12 months growth will cover 20% of the grille.

PIC 3 shows the grille after cleaning and the comment was made that all grilles are in excellent condition. Slow growing algae is normally left in place as this impedes the growth of more vigorous varieties.

PIC 4 shows seagrass growth at the end of the inlet pipe. Seagrass is healthy as it holds sand in place and prevents the sand building up.

We are grateful to our Mayor, Moira Jenkins for agreeing to be our guest speaker and we are sure she will bring us up to date on Council's plans to continue developing the City of Vic-

We have asked Moira if she might address several issues that have generated interest amongst residents. These are Council's future flood mitigation plans for Encounter Lakes and any thoughts Council might have to force lakefront residents to repair or remove unsound jetties.

If you live on either lake these issues should be of vital interest.

Do Your Bit to Keep our Lakes Healthy

It's great to be a keen gardener but keep in mind that almost all of the stormwater run-off from the more than 600 houses in our sub-division will end up in one of the lakes.

This can include poison, fertiliser and

grass cuttings from properties fronting the lakes, over the road or one

street back. Be careful when using a leaf blower, poisoning weeds or washing paving as these jobs produce waste that can pollute the lakes.

If you are in an area with large street trees call the Council on 8551 1501 if you see a need for trash racks to be emptied. The last problem area is dog droppings. If it's your dog, pick it up. If it's somebody elses, remind them of where the fouling will end up and the damage it can do.



Beware!

We all tend to think that Victor is a relatively crime free city and most of the time this is true. We have heard there was a recent break-in to a house in Strathmore Court that resulted in significant damage.

It might be worth reviewing your curr-

ent level of security to ensure you are minimizing the level of risk you face from potential burglars.
